


Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...



PATRON SAINT OF CATHOLIC EDUCATION. As we continue to navigate our next steps to develop and build an infrastructure for Catholic education in Franklin County, let us engage **St. John Neumann (1811-1860) - Patron Saint of Catholic Education.** He was a member of the Redemptorist order and became the fourth bishop of Philadelphia. While there he founded the first Catholic diocesan school system in the United States.

Neumann spent his life building churches, schools, and asylums for his diocese. He was devoted to education and was canonized in 1977 as the first U.S. male saint.

OUR FAITH.

STAINED GLASS: BLESSED SACRAMENT CHURCH SANCTUARY

"I am the Living Bread which came down from Heaven." - John 6:51

This window pane with its vibrant colors can be found in the main section of the sanctuary from the Federal Street entrance where you'll find a grouping of three panes. All of these windows have a Eucharistic theme. The right pane depicts one of Jesus' miracles.

The "Miracle of the Loaves and Fishes" tells the story of Jesus performing one of His miracles, as He feeds His followers with only a few loaves and fishes. This is one of the biblical stories to <u>appear in all four Gospels</u> and was influential in forming the first Christians' understanding of the Lord's identity and mission.

The crowd of 5,000 followed Jesus on foot from the towns. As evening approached, the disciples came Him and said, "This is a remote place, and it's already getting late. Send the crowds away, so they can go villages and buy themselves some food."

Jesus did not want to turn them away, and told His disciples they were to give them something to eat. Dumbfounded, they said that they only had five loaves and two fish that a young boy offered, which asked to be brought to Him. Jesus directed the people to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves the two fish and looking up to heaven, Jesus gave thanks and broke them. Then He gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the people. They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve baskets full of broken pieces that were left over. The number of those who ate was five thousand men, besides women and children.

We don't know much about this young boy who shared his few meager supplies. But what do know is that Jesus took what little the boy had to offer and fed the crowds. This is what does every time He gives Himself to us in the Eucharist at Mass. He gathers us around His table. He unites Himself completely with us by feeding us His own body and blood. He also feeds us with His word, and equips us to go out into the world and bring others to Him.

This story teaches the importance of sharing, making the most of what you have, and that we must place our trust in God. The miracle of the loaves and fishes holds an important lesson for how we are to act today. It is a prime example of how, like the disciples that day, all are called to place our trust in God.

So when you are at Mass this week, really approach the Eucharist through the eyes of faith. Just as we don't really understand what happened at the miracle of the loaves and fishes, we also don't know why Jesus chose to provide for us in this way. But faith tells us that He is present. So spend some time just absorbing His love with your heart instead of analyzing with your head.



5 Ways **Everyone** in a Parish Can Be More Welcoming.

For many Catholics, our parish is our second home. We worship there, we socialize, we lift each other up in prayer. We sing in the choir or serve on the parish committees. Our kids go to Vacation Bible

School and religious education. It's a very comfortable and welcoming place—except when it isn't. Remember going to a new church when travelling?

If you're new, it can be strange. There are no familiar faces. Where is the nursery? Where is the bathroom? Do I really want to stick around for coffee after Mass if I don't know anyone?

We need to work all the time to make sure our parish is welcoming. We can't hold a "new parishioner" coffee after Mass once or twice a year and call it good. Remember, we Catholics belong to the Universal Church. That means any Catholic Church in the world is "our" church, and we should never feel unwanted or unwelcome. Here are 5 ideas to help make your parish more welcoming.



- 1. Make sure greeters actually greet people. Sometimes, our greeters forget that what they are doing is absolutely vital to parish hospitality. Open the door as people walk in. If they know the person, greet them by name. Say, "Thank you for joining us today. We're glad you're here." It may not seem like much, but a couple of friendly faces as a person walks in goes a long way in making someone feel "at home."
- 2. No "stink eye." It's one of the hardest things for parents. They are trying to teach their young children how to behave at Mass, only to be given the stink eye by someone in the pews around them. Kids are kids. They are going to be squirmy. They will talk when they are not supposed to. However, short of a screaming fit or something equally disruptive, children must be welcome in church. If you see a dad struggling in the pew next to you, whisper a word of encouragement: "You're doing just fine." Offer to hold an infant while Mom gets an unruly preschooler under control. Even a warm smile is encouraging. The best way for parishes to thrive and grow is to make sure young families are welcomed.
- **3. Move over.** When the pews start to fill up, move over. Don't make the elderly couple crawl over you and your three kids to get into the pew. Yes, everyone sort of has "their" spot, the place they like to sit. But, honestly, does it make any difference? You hear the same homily if you're sitting in the middle of the pew or the end. Of course, sometimes there are legitimate reasons to sit at the end; for instance, there is an older person with a cane or walker that needs that space on the aisle. If you can, though, move over. And be cheerful about it.
- **4. Make parish registration a truly welcoming experience.** (This one is for the parish staff.) If you are new to the area, and you head over to the church to register, it is incredibly disheartening to be handed a piece of paper to fill out and a box of contribution envelopes and be sent on your way. Sit down with the person or family. Tell them they are welcome. Have they been away from the church? Ask if they have any sacramental needs (a baby that needs to be baptized, or a marriage that needs to be validated, for instance.) See if they have any questions, not just about the church, but the area, if they've just moved. A welcoming gift is great: a parish directory and a crucifix are always nice.
- 5. Work hard to make single people and those without children feel welcome. Let's face it, most families with children find a way to fit in. They start to meet others with kids in the same grade as theirs, or they volunteer for the religious ed. program. A young mother can join the weekly Bible study. But it can be much harder for single adults or those without kids to find their place to "fit" in a new parish. Encourage them to share their gifts and talents: lectoring, joining the choir, or helping with hospitality after Mass. Even sitting down with them after Mass over a cup of coffee and taking the time to introduce yourself is a wonderful and welcoming gesture.

Being a welcoming, hospitable parish takes work. Yet, when every member of that parish takes responsibility and does their part, a church really does feel welcoming to that new parishioner, a visitor or stranger. (diocesan.com)





SUMMER SUNDAYS DESTINATION: YORK BEACH, MAINE. Star-of-the-Sea Roman Catholic

Chapel was established in 1901 and is nestled just steps away from the Atlantic Ocean. This beach town's seasonal Chapel is open from Memorial Day through Columbus Day.



"Star-of-the-Sea" is an ancient title for the Virgin Mary. It is believed that this beautiful description for Mary – Our Lady Star of the Sea—originates from a mis-translation of her name from Hebrew, *Miryam*, meaning drop of the sea, into the Latin *Stella Maris*, Star of the Sea.

Not surprisingly, Our Lady Star of the Sea, *Stella Maris* or Star of the Sea has become a beloved title and devotion to Mary in many Catholic coastal communities. As the Mother of Jesus, Mary was His precious guide and constant companion. As our Mother she is also our guide. Just as the constellations guided the ancient seafarer safely back home, and the Christmas star led the Magi to the Christ Child, so too does Mary, as a star, guide us all gently to her Son our Savior, to a place where the

storms of life cannot destroy us.

History: Designed by John D'Orsi of Boston; windows by Francesco Ruocco of Merrimac, Massachusetts; marble sanctuary complete with a 14 foot Risen Christ figure along with Stations of the Cross all from the Castle Studios of Florence, Italy. It was dedicated by Bishop Peter L. Gerety on July 15, 1970.
