Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...

Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

As we peruse the pages of the bulletin each week, I draw your attention to the top of the first inside page. There you will find the Collect of the liturgical day we are celebrating that Sunday, whether it be a Sunday of Easter, Lent, Christmas, or Ordinary Time, or as today, a solemnity, like that of the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity.

The Collect is the prayer that gathers our intentions together as the People of God united in Christ the High Priest offering the sacrifice of the Mass. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (which governs the liturgical structure of the Eucharistic celebration) states:

Next the priest invites the people to pray. All, together with the priest, observe a brief silence so that they may be conscious of the fact that they are in God's presence and may formulate their petitions mentally. Then the priest says the prayer which is customarily known as the *collect* and through which the character of the celebration is expressed. In accordance with the ancient tradition of the Church, the collect prayer is usually addressed to God the Father, through Christ, in the Holy Spirit, and is concluded with a trinitarian ending (GIRM 54).

We, though many, are gathered in one voice to give praise and worship to Almighty God. We raise our intentions in this weekly act of sacrifice for the sanctification of our loved ones, our city and hills, our families, and ourselves. From the diversity of our experiences and backgrounds, even the happenings of the past week, we come together in this moment to be one in Christ, one is spirit, one in prayer. God invites us to be one in Him.

This does not mean uniformity or unilateralism, but authentic unity in the acknowledgement and adoration of the one God. We are hearers of His Word, proclaimers of His Truth. We are gifted in His Spirit and made holy in His sight. The Collect we hear today reminds and challenges us as such:

God our Father, who by sending into the world the Word of truth and the Spirit of sanctification made known to the human race your wondrous mystery, grant us, we pray, that in professing the true faith, we may acknowledge the Trinity of eternal glory and adore your Unity, powerful in majesty. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Celebrating today the great solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity may we recognize our call to unity as the People of God and our duty to foster that unity in word and action. God the Father gathers us together as one through Christ, the Incarnate Word, and breathes within us His very Spirit. In Word and Spirit, may we proclaim who He is and who we are, sons and daughters of God, to the glory of His Name!

Most Holy Trinity, I adore You! My God, I love you in the Most Blessed Sacrament!




OUR FAITH.

SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY.

Today we celebrate one of the most fundamental beliefs of Christianity: the Most Holy Trinity – three distinct, coequal Persons in one God. For the Church, the Trinity is considered a mystery. There are aspects of the Trinity that we will never fully grasp while we are this side of Heaven. But it is something we hold as revealed truth. We may never comprehend its totality, but we experience its presence and accept its reality.

There are references to the Holy Trinity in the Old Testament, but their meaning was mostly hidden. When Jesus became man through the Incarnation, He revealed the three Persons of the Trinity more fully. The Baptism of Jesus is one such "Trinitarian moment" when all three Persons are explicitly mentioned in the Bible – Jesus is being Baptized by John the



Baptist in the Jordan River, the Father's voice is heard from Heaven saying "This is my Beloved Son with whom I am well pleased," (Matthew 3:13-17) and the Holy Spirit is descending upon Jesus in the form of a dove.

The Solemnity of the Holy Trinity has been an official and universal celebration in the Catholic Church since the 1300's. It is even celebrated by many Protestant denominations as it is a fundamental belief shared by all Christians. During today's Mass, special prayers honor each of the Persons of the Trinity, but every Mass contains multiple references to the Trinity and prayers showing our devotion. This is evident in the most simple of prayers – the Sign of the Cross. We make this action upon entering and leaving the Church, and at the beginning and end of Mass, and even sometimes during the Mass. The words that accompany the action express our belief in the Holy Trinity – "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen." Even when done silently, the action itself becomes a prayer!

The next time that you attend Mass, make a point to notice how many times we make the Sign of the Cross. Think about the words. Listen, too, for other prayers throughout the Mass that honor the Holy Trinity. Of course, the Creed (Profession of Faith) is probably the most obvious, but you will find others that express our belief in the Holy Trinity - three Divine Persons in one God. by Rev. You are most welcome to attend our first meeting as a group to be held on **Saturday June 10th 11:00 AM- 12:00 PM.** I will have materials for you as regards volunteers at the jail, along with a brief history of the practices involved.

Your input is going to be critical as we form what the future will hold for these very dear children of God. Thank you & God Bless!

STAINED GLASS: BLESSED SACRAMENT CHURCH TRANSEPTS AND NAVE

As we celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation this weekend for 12 of our young parishioners at Blessed Trinity Parish, our next window ties in nicely. Of the two windows in the choir section, we will be looking at the window on the right.

"Then they laid hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit". Acts 8:17

The Sacrament of Confirmation seals the baptized person with the gift of the Holy Spirit and strengthens his/her service to the Body of Christ. This Sacrament is one of seven and can be found in Bible passages Acts 8:14 –17, 9:17, 19:6, and Hebrews 6:2, which speak of a laying on of hands for the purpose of bestowing the Holy Spirit.

"When the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had received the word of God, they sent to them Peter and John, who came down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit; for it had not yet fallen on any of them, but they had only

been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid their hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit." (Act 8:14-17)

So, while Christians are baptized "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19), as Jesus directs, they receive the Holy Spirit in a different sacrament that confirms and strengthens their lives as believers.

During Confirmation, the bishop extends his hands over those to be confirmed and calls upon God: "Send your Holy Spirit upon them to be their helper and guide." Then each person to be confirmed is anointed with chrism (oil) on the forehead as the bishop says, "Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit."

The Holy Spirit bestows **seven gifts—Wisdom, Understanding, Knowledge, Fortitude, Counsel, Piety, and Fear of the Lord**—to assist us in our mission and witness. The impact of these gifts accompanies us in the various stages of our spiritual development.



It's interesting to note at the top of the window, beneath the dove—representing the Holy Spirit—there are **seven** "droplets" within the white colored glass raining down over Peter (right) and John (left) and the three kneeling Samarians. It could represent the **seven gifts or the seven sacraments or both.**

According to Catholic tradition, St. Peter was the oldest among the Apostles; while St. John was the youngest Apostle. At the time of the crucifixion, it is believed that Peter was about the same age as Jesus (30-33), while John was an older teenage, approximately 18. As we look at the window, Peter is on the right with receding hairline and mature face while the youthful looking John is on the left.

ON THE COVER.

On the cover you may recognize the painting, *Adoration of the Holy Sacrament* or "La Disputa" by famed Italian artist, Raphael. Completed in 1510, and found in the papal halls of the Vatican, Raphael has created a scene spanning both heaven and earth.

At the heights, the Holy Trinity centers the Heavenly throne. The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are surrounded by a cloud of witnesses, the Church of Heaven, with the Blessed Virgin Mary and St. John the Baptist at the right and left of Christ. Various biblical figures, such as St. Paul, Adam, St. Peter, King David, and Moses accompany the angels and saints bearing homage to God.



In our midst, the Church on Earth adores the Blessed Sacrament, as a monstrance stands on the altar. The great poets, teachers, and Doctors of the Church, like St. Augustine, St. Ignatius of Antioch, St. Thomas Aquinas, and more contemplate the mysteries of faith and reason. In the pursuit of truth, out of the midst of chaos, a direct line is drawn and centered between the Holy Trinity and the Blessed Sacrament. It is the incarnate and living Word of God, the Holy Eucharist, that bridges the realm of Heaven and the realm of Earth.

In the background on the left, a church is being constructed, representing the one, holy, Catholic, and apostolic Church, the Bride of Christ, our

mother and home. In a sense, this is representative of our own new parish, coming together right here in Greenfield.

"The Disputation of the Holy Sacrament represents Christianity's victory over the multiple philosophical tendencies (with the

foremost Plato and Aristotle) shown in the School of Athens fresco painted on the opposite wall. Unlike the philosophers of the School of Athens, who are gathered together in a vaulted temple, the theologians of the Disputation make up the Church's architecture. They form one body, united in an ethereal apse flanking the Trinity and the Blessed Sacrament, which when consecrated becomes the body of Christ."
