Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...

Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

This weekend we are invited to gaze upon the transfigured Lord as He displays the radiance of His majesty as the fulfillment of the Law and the Prophets in His very person. Jesus is the incarnation of the Father's love. He invites us to recognize, even in a world of broken humanity, the realization of divine love and merciful grace.

In commenting on the Gospel we have heard today, Pope St. Leo the Great writes

The Lord reveals his glory in the presence of chosen witnesses. His body is like that of the rest of mankind, but he makes it shine with such splendor that his face becomes like the sun in glory, and his garments as white as snow.

The great reason for this transfiguration was to remove the scandal of the cross from the hearts of his disciples, and to prevent the humiliation of his voluntary suffering from disturbing the faith of those who had witnessed the surpassing glory that lay concealed.

With no less forethought he was also providing a firm foundation for the hope of holy Church. The whole body of Christ was to understand the kind of transformation that it would receive as his gift. The members of that body were to look forward to a share in that glory which first blazed out in Christ their head.

In Christ Jesus we are made new. Indeed, He makes all things new. While yet in this body we still bear the pain and suffering of our human woundedness and even death, we are called to a living hope. While we feel the burden of the dark and the cold, we are able to recognize the light of truth and the warmth of God's tender love. Do not lose hope!

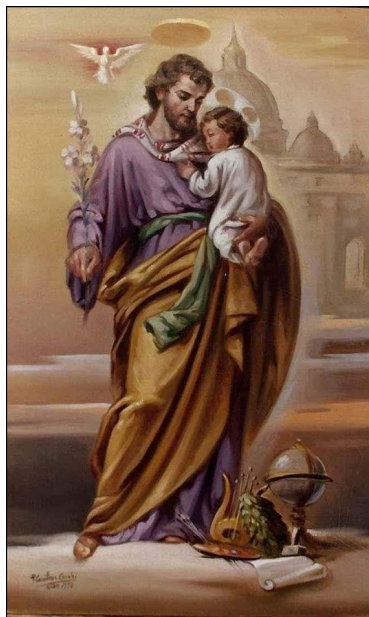
The efforts of our parish going forward must be a visible proclamation of this profound faith and abiding hope. It must be our Lenten duty to accompany one another, neighbors and strangers alike, through the dryness of desert living to the oasis of divine life. Christ Jesus has called us to be His witnesses. MARCH: THE MONTH OF SAINT JOSEPH. Even though St. Joseph never spoke a word in scripture, his silent example of obedient faithfulness and diligent care for the Holy Family during Jesus' formative years has made him one of the most beloved saints of Christianity. When we explore some of the phenomenal fathers in the Bible it's impossible to overlook Joseph, Jesus' earthly father. There are many lessons we can take away from what we know of his life, particularly his obedience to God when it came to the announcement of Jesus' birth. Joseph has a great deal to teach us all about obedience and unconditional love. The Bible tells us that Joseph was a man pledged to be married to Jesus' mother, Mary. He was faithful to the Jewish faith and he was a carpenter, as the scriptures proclaim..



LESSON ONE: JOSEPH TEACHES US KINDNESS. Joseph faced a choice when he learned that Mary was pregnant. But while Joseph could have shamed Mary and divorce her quietly, he decided to be kind and not to expose her to public disgrace after a visit from an angel of the Lord in a dream.

LESSON TWO: HE TEACHES US OBEDIENCE. After Joseph considered divorce, Matthew tells us that an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream with a message. (Matthew 1:20-21). When Joseph awoke, he could continue with the divorce or listen to the angel. In the end, Joseph chose obedience and "took Mary home to be his wife" (verse 24). We should look to God and not our own whims when it comes to making important life decisions.

LESSON THREE: HE IS A PROTECTOR. Joseph was also a wonderful protector. Matthew 2:13 reveals that an angel of the Lord again appeared in a dream and told Joseph to flee with Jesus and Mary to protect them. The angel warned that Herod would try to kill Christ. So, he got up and fled to Egypt with Mary and Jesus. The family stayed there until Herod's death. **Joseph's repeated obedience and protective measures are a guide to all parents.**—*Billy Hallowell, Christian Author*

LENTEN REGULATIONS 2023

1. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of abstinence from meat as well as days of fast, when only one full meal is allowed. On days of fast, two other meatless meals may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal.
2. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat.
3. The obligation to abstain from meat begins at age fourteen (14) and does not cease.
4. The obligation to fast begins at age eighteen (18) and ceases at age fifty-nine (59).

Please note: Although the faithful may excuse themselves from fast and abstinence, for a just cause, there is an obligation to substitute another penance in its place. No Catholic should lightly excuse him/herself from these Lenten obligations.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Available during pastoral visit, Sacrament of Confession, or by appointment.

The Stations of the Cross are representations of the path Jesus bore on his way to the crucifixion. They involve Jesus enduring suffering, insults, moments of support, and the intense sacrifice that Christians believe Jesus undertook for human salvation. The object of the Stations is to help the faithful make a pilgrimage (in spirit) to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death. Most simply, they are usually performed during Lent, especially on Good Friday, and are about **remembering Christ's suffering for our sake.**

# OUR YOUTH.

## LENT: PRAY, FAST, GIVE.



Here's an easy, kid-friendly craft perfect for Lent to help them discover firsthand the real meaning of Lent.

This project has three pockets to hold ideas for 3 marks of Lent—PRAY, FAST, GIVE. Here is a list

of possible kid-friendly ways they can pray, fast, and give. (Not a bad list for adults either!) You or your kids could also create your own ideas and write them on small cards or strips of paper.

Each morning, each child pulls 3 strips—one from each pocket—and has the goal of completing that sacrifice or prayer by the end of the day. Over dinner you can talk about how they accomplished these goals and how they felt. The next morning, they choose three new things.

This can help them focus and be successful over the course of the long 40 days, and it also can stretch them in a new way each day, leaving room for the Holy Spirit to work in their hearts.

NOTE: If you aren't feeling crafty, just use 3 envelopes. The kids can decorate them and then post them on the fridge or bulletin board so they will see each day.

# OUR FAITH.

## **GUIDE TO CONFESSION - NET MINISTRIES**

**PREPARING FOR CONFESSION** • Pray for the Holy Spirit to help enlighten your conscience so you may know your sins, be sorry for them, and tell them honestly and sincerely. • With the Holy Spirit's help, identify your sins (what sins and how often). • Pray for courage to make a good confession and prepare to receive the great gift of forgiveness. Remember, Jesus wants what is best for you. He is waiting to forgive you and welcome you back.

**MAKING YOUR CONFESSION.** When you arrive at confession, the priest will greet you and both of you will make the Sign of the Cross. You may begin by saying: "Forgive me Father, for I have sinned. It has been (state length of time) since my last confession. These are my sins." Then tell your sins, especially any serious sins. The priest will give the necessary advice and assign penance. Then, you pray the Act of Contrition (see below). It is okay to take the prayer on a piece of paper in with you. You may also say your own Act of Contrition, as long as your prayer mentions that you are sincerely sorry, and that you will try not to commit these sins again. Then the priest will give you absolution (forgiveness). Do your penance as soon as possible.

**ACT OF CONTRITION.** O my God, I am heartily sorry for having off ended You, and I detest all of my sins, because I dread the loss of heaven and the pains of hell, but most of all because they off end You, my God, who are all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly intend, with the help of Your grace, to sin no more and to avoid the near occasion of sin. Amen.

**EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE.** The examination of conscience generally takes place before going to individual confession but can be used at any time to review one's past. The purpose is to call to mind our sins in an orderly fashion (using the Ten Commandments), to best prepare to receive God's forgiveness.

**1. I AM THE LORD YOUR GOD. YOU SHALL NOT HAVE STRANGE GODS BEFORE ME.** • Do I pray daily, and seek to place God as the highest priority in my life? • Do I seek to surrender myself to God's Word, as taught by the guidance of the Church? • Have I been involved with superstitious practices or witchcraft (Ouija board, tarot cards, fortune telling, horoscopes), which falsely attribute power to anyone or anything else than God? • Have I received communion knowingly while in a state of mortal sin, without making an effort to go to confession? • Have I ever purposely withheld a sin from the priest in confession?

**2. YOU SHALL NOT TAKE THE NAME OF THE LORD YOUR GOD IN VAIN.** • Have I used God's name carelessly? Have I sworn or used foul language? • Have I told jokes which ridicule God, Mary, or the Saints? • Have I ever wished for evil upon someone?

**3. REMEMBER TO KEEP HOLY THE SABBATH.** • Have I deliberately missed Mass on Sundays or on other Holy Days of Obligation? • Do I pay attention and participate at Mass, or am I passive and uninvolved? • Have I tried to keep Sunday as a day of rest and a time for family? Do I do needless work on Sunday?

**4. HONOR YOUR FATHER AND MOTHER.** • Do I do my best to honor and obey my parents, and those in authority in my life? • Have I ever insulted my father or mother, swearing at them, or talking poorly about them to others? • When I have wronged my parents, do I apologize and admit my failings? • Have I used tobacco, or drank alcohol against the wishes of my parents?

**5. YOU SHALL NOT KILL.** • Have I had an abortion or encouraged anyone to do so? • Have I abused alcohol or other drugs? • Have I driven recklessly, possibly putting myself or others at risk? • Have I harbored feelings of hatred or envy towards others, been resentful or jealous? • Have I been in any fights (physical or verbal)?

**6. YOU SHALL NOT COMMIT ADULTERY.** • Have I respected members of the opposite sex, or have I treated them as objects? • Do I sincerely seek to be chaste (pure) in my thoughts, words, and actions? • Have I engaged in impure acts by myself (romantic fantasy or masturbation)? • Have I engaged in sexual touching with another person or had sexual intercourse?

**7. YOU SHALL NOT STEAL.** • Have I stolen anything from a store or another person which is not rightfully mine? • Do I cheat in school, either by copying homework or stealing answers on a test? • Do I waste time at school or at work, thereby cheating myself or my employer?

**8. YOU SHALL NOT BEAR FALSE WITNESS AGAINST YOUR NEIGHBOR.** • Have I lied or deliberately withheld the entire truth to protect myself? • Have I exaggerated any claims to make myself look better, or to impress my friends? • Have I gossiped, telling things about someone to harm their good name? • Do I keep confidential what was told to me in secret, or do I break my word?

**9. YOU SHALL NOT COVET (DESIRE) YOUR NEIGHBOR'S WIFE.** • Have I consented to impure thoughts, not trying to control my imagination? • Have I looked at pornographic videos, magazines, computer images or stories? • Have I told impure jokes or stories that would offend God or the dignity of others?

**10. YOU SHALL NOT COVET (DESIRE) YOUR NEIGHBOR'S GOODS.** • Am I jealous of other people's gifts, talents, or possessions? Am I greedy or selfish? • Am I materialistic? Do I think about the poor? Do I make an effort to reach out to help them?

## **DISPEL THE DARKNESS ~ BY MARY FLEURY**

### **I AM THE LORD YOUR GOD. YOU SHALL NOT HAVE STRANGE GODS BEFORE ME.**

How many ways have you let Satan into your life? Does the question irritate you? Do you immediately reject the idea?

There was a time in my life when I would have firmly rejected the question. I would have become huffy and started defending myself listing all the good things I was doing for God.

**THEN:** One cold, dreary winter night I came dragging home. I was attending Continuing Ed. Classes working towards a degree in Education. I was sick with some kind of bug but hadn't wanted to miss class. So much covered in each session it would be difficult to catch up. My husband, Les, was watching a TV show. I dropped on the sofa. I will never forget what happened next. I don't know if it was a vision or a dream. I saw myself standing in the doorway looking across a totally empty room, staring at an empty doorway across the room from me. A very sweet, grandmotherly looking woman came through the door. I very calmly watched her walk towards me. I had no apprehension at all. When she stood next to me I was suddenly being choked to death. I couldn't breathe. I gasped the name, "Jesus." The pressure started to break. As I repeated "Jesus, Jesus," it dissipated. I could breathe again. I was shaken by the whole experience.

The next day I shared what happened with a woman who was much wiser in spiritual matters than I. She advised me to take some time in prayer and ask the Holy Spirit where I had opened a door for Satan to enter my life. Then ask God's forgiveness for each time and to ask the Holy Spirit to clean and fill the empty spaces.

Today, I would 'Go to confession'. Jesus gave us the sacrament of Reconciliation to keep the room filled with His Spirit.

It was amazing what was revealed. I can still remember the many ways the Holy Spirit showed how I had given pieces of my spirit to Satan. No wonder I was depressed. Like the sweet, grandmotherly woman, it had all seemed very innocent and harmless. But, whenever we put something else in God's place, there is a price to be paid.

**First Time:** Hurray! We received a box of goodies our cousins had outgrown. Hey, cool! A Ouija board. This is a neat game. **Wrong!** It was not an innocent game. I did not intend anything evil but I opened a door.

**Second Time:** Reading astrology forecasts.\* There was a time in my life when I even thought perhaps God wanted to communicate this way. **Wrong again!**

The list went on. As I repented each thing, I began to feel lighter and freer. There would be tough times ahead but thank you Jesus for your freedom and light. Thank you Jesus I did not fall into an abyss of darkness. You really are the Way, the Truth, and the Light Your Love and Your Mercy endure forever. Jesus, you really are our Savior.

Go to Jesus in prayer. Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal any time you gave up a piece of your soul. Walk in the light and freedom of God. And learn what scripture can tell you about what to avoid. The Bible is God's instructional manual. He created us. We often try to live life by ignoring the instructions. No wonder we have screws and bolts out of place. Remember, Jesus instructed us to pray in the Our Father, "Deliver us from evil". We may in our ignorance open the door but Satan plays for keeps for your soul. He presents opportunities to sin that appear as sweet and innocent as that grandmotherly woman I saw. Take the bait and you can be hooked like a fish fighting for your life.

Today we have one more marvelous tool available. The Catechism of the Catholic Church. It will provide the Biblical references for each topic.

\*2116 All forms of divination are to be rejected: recourse to Satan or demons, conjuring up the dead or other practices falsely suppose to "unveil" the future. Consulting horoscopes, astrology, palm reading, interpretation of omens and lots, the phenomena of clairvoyance, and recourse to mediums all conceal a desire for power and over time, history and, in the last analysis, other human beings, as well as a wish to conciliate hidden powers. They contradict the honor, respect, and loving fear that we owe to God alone.
