# WHY IS THE HOLY SPIRIT REPRESENTED BY A DOVE? Doves are found throughout the Bible, from



Noah's Ark to the baptism of Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit is specifically mentioned as coming in the form of a dove. By the time of the New Testament, doves were already very much associated with God and specifically his Spirit. Early Christians readily accepted this imagery and soon after began depicting the Holy Spirit almost exclusively as a dove.



# OUR FAITH.

#### PENTECOST SUNDAY.

This weekend, the Church celebrates Pentecost, one of the most important feast days of the year that concludes the Easter season and celebrates the beginning of the Church.



#### Timing and Origins.

Pentecost always occurs 50 days after the death and Resurrection of Jesus, and ten days after his Ascension into heaven. Because Easter is a moveable feast without a fixed date, Pentecost depends on the timing of Easter. The name of the day itself is derived from the Greek word "pentecoste," meaning 50th. There is a parallel Jewish holiday, Shavu`ot, which falls 50 days after Passover.

In the Christian tradition, Pentecost is the celebration of the person of the Holy Spirit coming upon the Apostles, Mary, and the first followers of Jesus, who were gathered together in the Upper Room. A "strong, driving" wind filled the room where they were gathered, and tongues of fire came to rest on their heads, allowing them to speak in different languages so that they could understand each other. It was such a strange phenomenon that some people thought the Christians were just drunk - but Peter pointed out that it was only the morning, and said the phenomenon was caused by the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit also gave the apostles the other gifts and fruits necessary to fulfill the great commission - to go out and preach

the Gospel to all nations. It fulfills the New Testament promise from Christ (Luke 24:46-49) that the Apostles would be "clothed with power" before they would be sent out to spread the Gospel.

*Celebrating Many Firsts.* Pentecost is considered the birthday of the Church - Peter, the first Pope, preaches for the first time and converts thousands of new, first-time believers. The apostles and believers, for the first time, were united by a common language, and a common zeal and purpose to go and preach the Gospel.

#### Vestments and Customs Around the World.

Typically, priests will wear red vestments on Pentecost, symbolic of the burning fire of God's love and the tongues of fire that descended on the apostles.

However, in some parts of the world, Pentecost is also referred to as "WhitSunday", or White Sunday, referring to the white vestments that are typically worn in Britain and Ireland. The white is symbolic of the dove of the Holy Spirit, and typical of the vestments that catechumens desiring baptism wear on that day.

An Italian Pentecost tradition is to scatter rose leaves from the ceiling of the churches to recall the miracle of the fiery tongues, and so in some places in Italy, Pentecost is sometimes called Pascha Rosatum (Easter roses).

In France, it is tradition to blow trumpets during Mass to recall the sound of the driving wind of the Holy Spirit.

In Asia, it is typical to have an extra service, called genuflection, during which long poems and prayers are recited. In Russia, Mass goers often carry flowers or green branches during Pentecost services.

**Novena.** The timing of these feasts is also where Catholics get the concept of the Novena - nine days of prayer - because in Acts 1, Mary and the Apostles prayed together "continuously" for nine days after the Ascension leading up to Pentecost. Traditionally, **the Church prays the Novena** to the Holy Spirit in the days before Pentecost. (CatholicNewsAgency.com)

# **OUR YOUTH.**

#### BREAD OF LIFE YOUTH PROGRAM.

"We've been running the Bread of Life meal since 2005" according to Deacon John Leary when asked to explain this program recently. This program is run by our Blessed Trinity Parish youth and is based on the **Take and Eat program** (takeandeat.org) that was founded in 2003 by Rev. Mr. Francis Ryan, Ed.D and his wife Kathleen. It's a Non-Profit organization to recruit, train and empowers volunteers in various faith-based community organizations to prepare and deliver, free of charge, hot meals to the home-bound elderly on weekends and 3-day holidays. The government funded Meals-on-Wheels Program only provides meals to seniors from Monday through Friday. On weekends and holidays these elders in need for the most part, have no access to a nutritious meal and in many instances have no contact with another human being.



The Take and Eat program works from three basic assumptions:

- 1. That most churches and congregations have a functioning kitchen that is probably underutilized.
- 2. That there are elder citizens who receive Meals-on-Wheels in the Church's immediate area.
- 3. That the members of the faith community want to "put shoes on the Scripture Message" and seize the opportunity to help those in need.

"We can remember our first meal. We had more volunteers than we had meal recipients! We grew the local meal to include 3 additional organizations—The Knights of Columbus, Saint James and Saint Andrew Episcopal Church, and Second Congregational Church—so that the elderly and shut ins received a meal every weekend. Over the years we transitioned to asking our confirmation classes and parents to be responsible for the meals and it's called "Bread of Life". At the height of the success of the meal we were responsible for preparing, cooking and delivering over 150 meals each week to home-bound elders and shutins. However, because of the COVID-19 crisis we transitioned away from a home delivered meal to a grocery giveaway program located at Beacon Field. That grocery giveaway program then transitioned into what is our Parish Food Pantry today. We've had so many wonderful volunteers over the years step-up and help "put shoes on the Gospel." We couldn't have done it without all of them." - Deacon John & Donna Leary



# OUR HERITAGE.

#### STAINED GLASS: PERPETUAL ADORATION CHAPEL

May is dedicated to our Blessed Mother and the timing is right as we explore the final window in the Chapel depicting three more Madonnas.



As you step into the chapel you'll see a set of three windows on your right. The window panel closest to the door is our focus today where you'll find the three Madonnas.

Our Lady of Guadelupe. Mary appeared to St. Juan Diego at dawn Dec. 9, 1531, on Tepeyac Hill, in what is now northern Mexico City. She appeared to him twice more. The last time, on Dec. 12, the Virgin bundled flowers into his cloak, known as a 'tilma'. Although it was winter and nothing should have been in bloom, he found an abundance of flowers of a type he had never seen before. When Juan Diego presented the tilma of exotic flowers to Zumárraga (the first Bishop of Mexico), the flowers fell out and he recognized them as Castilian roses, which are not found in Mexico.

What was even more significant, however, was that the cloak had been miraculously imprinted with a colorful image of the Virgin herself. This cloak is enshrined in the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City.



Our Lady of Africa. Also known as the Black Madonna, Our Lady of Africa is a Catholic title for the Blessed Virgin Mary depicted as a Black woman. One famous statue is located at Notre-Dame d'Afrique in Algiers, Algeria. Found in hundreds of Catholic churches across Europe and Latin America, the Black Madonna has dark skin, and remains one of the most mysterious religious icons. She has a complex history and many possible meanings. She is not clothed in a blue robe, but rather in red signifying love, passion, and devotion—all traits connected with motherhood and exemplified by Mary's presence at the Crucifixion. Mary is willing to sacrifice her life for her son. This act of devotion makes her a perfect role model for mothers everywhere.



Our Lady with St. Kateri Tekakwitha. (Lily of the Mohawks) Saint Kateri Tekakwitha is the patron saint of ecology, Indigenous Peoples, and care for creation. She often went to the woods alone to speak to God and listen to Him in her heart and in the voice of nature. St. Kateri is the first Native American to be recognized as a saint by the Catholic Church. Born in 1656, in a Mohawk village she contracted smallpox as a child which scarred her skin, resulting in a source of



humiliation for her and was commonly seen wearing a blanket to hide her face. Her Algonquin mother, a prayerful Catholic shared stories of faith to her in her early childhood. These remained impressed on her mind and heart and were to shape the direction to her life's destiny. Tragically her entire family died during the outbreak and she was raised by her uncle, the chief of a Mohawk village. When she was 18, a Jesuit missionary came to the village and she was fascinated by the stories he told about Jesus. She yearned to learn more. At the age of 19 she converted to Catholicism. Although unable to read and write, Kateri led a life of prayer and penitential practices. She taught the young and helped those in the village who were poor or sick. People referred to her as the "Holy Woman." Kateri spoke words of kindness to everyone she encountered. However, because of her devotion, she was seen as an outcast in her village. She was given extra work, at times denied food, suffered bullying and neighbors started rumors of sorcery. She was threatened by some with torture or death if she did not renounce her religion. With increasing hostility and her deep desire to be free to devote her life

completely to Jesus, in 1677, Kateri left her village and traveled more than 200 miles through woods and rivers to the Catholic mission of St. Francis Xavier near Montreal. She often prayed for the conversion of her fellow Mohawks. Sadly, in 1680 just five years after her conversion to Catholicism, she became ill and passed away at the age of 24. #### THE HOLY SEE FLAG.

You may have noticed recently that this flag was installed throughout Blessed Trinity Parish, but what is its Significance?

The Holy See flag has been in formal existence since the founding of the Vatican City state in 1929, although elements of it existed before this.

The **Holy See** is the entity that governs both the actual territory of **Vatican** City and the entirety of Roman Catholicism around the world. This flag, also known as the Vatican flag) has existed in several forms throughout the history of the Catholic church. **In 1849** 



Pope Pius IX ordered the yellow and white to be oriented vertically and the Vatican coat of arms was added. The Vatican has been an independent state since 1929, when the current flag was adopted.

**Colors.** The Holy See flag is a vertical bicolor of "gold" and "silver" bands. The gold (yellow) symbolizes **Heavenly power** while the silver (white) **represents Earthly power**. Centered in the white band is the Papal Coat of Arms.

**The Papal Coat of Arms.** The two keys on the Papal Coat of Arms – one golden (Heavenly power) and one silver (Earthly power) - represent the keys that Jesus gave to Saint Peter, a disciple of Jesus and who became the first Pope. **The red string** that connects these two keys is a symbol of interconnection between these two powers.



In western paintings and sculptures, Peter is always depicted with the keys. According to the Gospel of Matthew 16:19, Jesus said to St. Peter, "I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven.". Above the keys is the Papal Tiara which has been worn by Popes from the 8th Century up until Pope Paul VI in 1963.

The flag is displayed in many Catholic Churches around the world. Often when walking through Rome you can recognize an embassy to the Vatican with the Vatican flag on display. The Vatican flag was even taken to the moon on Apollo 11. That flag is now on display in the Vatican Museum alongside some moon rocks.
